# An English Count of the Holy Roman Empire.

#### Knights of the Garter and Garter ceremonies.

With dates of election, investment with Garter insignia, installation. At Eve of Garter the Queen appointed a Lieutenant to represent her in any parts of the ceremonies which she did not attend in person. Knights were usually elected and invested on the same day. Installations were at Windsor; the Queen, who did not attend, again appointed a Lieutenant, or Commissioners. The Knights held a Feast at Windsor 1559-1563, 1565-1566; thereafter they had a dinner after the ceremonies at court. The three days of ceremonies were referred to as 'St George's Feast'.

It was customary for the Garter insignia of a foreign Knight to be returned to England by a special Ambassador.
